FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As ICA Food Shelf and the surrounding community continue to navigate the various challenges associated with the coronavirus pandemic, our focus remains on redefining access and adapting to the changing needs of our neighbors.

This past year, ICA launched a new strategic plan that is dedicated to community outreach and growth in ways we never thought possible.

Together, we are working to break down barriers and make access to our services easier.



One of the ways in which we're redefining access is through home deliveries. This service is intended to benefit seniors and other homebound neighbors who are unable to visit our central food shelf location on K-Tel Drive. In just the past fiscal year, our home deliveries increased by 30%.

Another strategic effort to ease the burden on families and ensure the needs of their children are met is a planned expansion into the local school districts. Since opening the first-ever ICA Market and Resource Center at Gatewood Elementary, we recently launched another school-based market and resource center at Alice Smith Elementary School and a pantry at Hopkins High School. The goal is to eliminate transportation barriers for families to access our food and case management resources.

Thank you for being the source of support for families in our community. **Together, we can support all our neighbors who need help.**

MEETING OUR NEIGHBORS WHERE THEY LIVE

When COVID-19 first impacted our community, ICA switched almost immediately from in-person, in-house shopping to serving our clients curbside, with the goal of keeping our community safe while still meeting the need. We've since re-opened in-person client services at our K-Tel Drive location, but understand many neighbors are still unable to visit the food shelf due to COVID, physical limitations, or transportation barriers. Because of that, our focus remains on expanding home deliveries and community-based resources.



Last year, local Rotarians raised the funds for ICA to purchase another delivery vehicle (pictured above). This van is instrumental for the growth of our home deliveries.

FOOD SHELF & FOOD PROGRAMS

ICA provides nutritious, well-balanced, and culturally relevant food to our neighbors facing food insecurity. ICA's food shelf is choice-model, allowing neighbors to select foods they and their family eat and know how to cook. We offer a wide selection of fresh produce, dairy, protein, and other perishable foods, as well as non-perishable vegetables, protein, grains, and more.

MOBILE FOOD SHELF & HOME DELIVERY

ICA's mobile food shelf delivers food to low-income apartment buildings in our service area, while home delivery is available for neighbors who are unable to come into the food shelf due to disability or medical reasons.

TURKEY & HOLIDAY MEAL PROGRAM

During the 2020 holiday season, ICA distributed 1,115 turkeys and all the fixings to neighbors for their Thanksgiving or holiday meal.

The program includes turkey, fresh vegetables, canned goods, and more -- everything needed to create a holiday meal.



SCHOOL PROGRAMS: WEEKEND PACKS & SNACK BINS

ICA works with 17 schools within the Minnetonka and Hopkins School Districts to provide weekend food and snacks to students in need. Weekend food packs provide additional food to students on the weekend and during breaks when school breakfast and lunches are not available.

Snack bins are filled with healthy, grab-and-go snacks for students experiencing food insecurity. These items replace a missing breakfast or mid-day snack as needed.

KIDS' SUMMER MARKET

ICA's Kids' Summer Market provides extra food to families with children during the summer. This food helps replace missed meals children usually receive through their school's free and reduced price lunch program. Additional food choices include milk, eggs, fruit, cereal, sandwich fixings, and more.

Helping Single Parents Like Ryan

Recently, an ICA Case Manager met with Ryan, a single father who lost his job due to COVID. When his unemployment benefits ran out, he was in immediate need for food and came to ICA Food Shelf.

After receiving food, the ICA Case Manager helped Ryan identify other resources he would benefit from including energy assistance, employment assistance, and the warm winter program offered by another community organization, ResourceWest. Ryan and his family now have reliable access to nutritious food and warm clothing for the winter months.



In addition to helping stop the immediate crisis, ICA offers wrap-around services that give Ryan the necessary tools and training to land the perfect next position.

HOUSING STABILITY & HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION

ICA provides financial assistance on a case-by-case basis for rent and utilities, as well as referrals to other area service agencies. This program is aimed at helping people stay in their homes, thereby increasing stability and preventing homelessness. We also provide bus passes and other transportation help to ensure clients have transportation to and from work and medical appointments.

ICA's homelessness prevention program grew exponentially in large part due to our partnership with Hennepin County, City of Minnetonka & City of Hopkins. Through these short-term programs, our housing assistance program was able to distribute 470% more funds in 2021.

These one-time, short-term COVID-19 relief funds, along with individual contributions, allowed ICA to deepen our role as a hub of services that eased the difficulties of the pandemic for hundreds of families.

EMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE

ICA assists clients with their job search and provides various job services, including resume development, job search tools, and coaching.

Rental Assistance for Neighbors Like Barb*

Due to health problems, Barb is limited to mostly part-time and seasonal work. With an inconsistent income, she periodically will use ICA services when times are tough. After losing a seasonal job, she met with an ICA Case Manager and was able to receive rent assistance. Those funds were enough to keep her living in the same apartment and away from homelessness.

Shortly after receiving help, her vehicle broke down and the necessary repairs cost almost as much as her monthly rent. Without receiving assistance from ICA, she would have lost her main source of transportation. With her vehicle repaired, Barb found the perfect position for her situation and has a reliable form of transportation to get to and from her job.




