A Record Season Serving our Neighbors

With kids home from school, we know the summer months can be an extremely busy time for Minnesota families. It's no exception here at ICA, where we're serving more neighbors than we have in years. Rising costs at the gas pump, grocery store checkout, and elsewhere, are driving more and more families to our door as they seek a helping hand.

Last month alone, ICA provided nearly 1,500 food service orders to over 900 different families. Of all those households, over 80 are brand-new to ICA food services.

Our *ICA Summer Produce Markets* remain busy, as they provided 241 services last month. Roughly an eighth of all those visits were from families that have never previously utilized ICA programs. In addition to record-breaking food distribution numbers, our case managers allocated over \$27,000 in financial assistance this past month.

In fact, we're so busy that we're expanding our hours! We are now open for regular Saturday hours going forward with the belief that adding weekend time slots will help working families avoid a long wait for services.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Something we often talk about within our organization is that as the community continues to change, we have an obligation to change with it and tailor our services to the specific needs of our neighbors.

We're finding that hundreds of new families are moving into our main service area and seeking our assistance. The specific numbers are on track with what we experienced at the very beginning of the coronavirus pandemic.

Additionally, we're receiving feedback that rising inflation is causing many local households to cut back on expenses and in turn, they're using our services to help bridge the gap.

We're also witnessing an influx of refugee families in our community that are essentially starting their life anew. This can include settling into a new living space, searching for new jobs, adapting to a new culture, and attempting to learn a new language.

As more neighbors come to us with a similar backstory, we're busy changing our approach to make the transition as easy as possible for both them and their families.

For example, we recently expanded our in-person interpreter services to cover four different non-English languages. A neighbor can come to us and find helpful volunteers speaking fluent Spanish, Russian, Somali, and Ukrainian on a weekly basis. We've also partnered with an outside service group to offer translation services over the phone in dozens of languages.

With this in mind, *more than ever*, we're relying on our outstanding community of supporters to elevate our efforts. A gift to ICA goes directly to our mission of providing stability to each and every one of our neighbors.





ICA EXPANDING SERVICES INTO MORE LOCAL SCHOOLS

After laying the groundwork of school-based market and resource centers last fall, ICA is continuing to expand into more area schools and offer a wide range of services to local families.

This month, a grand opening ceremony is taking place for a new facility at West Junior High School, while a similar space will be officially opening at Alice Smith Elementary following a soft launch earlier in the year.

ICA is continuing forward with an expansion into local schools based off feedback from area teachers, counselors, and families. The resounding response is that this type of structure is paramount for families that have barriers to accessing services at our central location.

Statistics provided by West Junior High indicate that nearly 20% of their entire academic population are open enrollment. These students are bussed to Hopkins each day from all corners of the Twin Cities Metro

area, many of which live with their families in North Minneapolis neighborhoods where they are more vulnerable to resource insecurities than local area school children.

With fresh and nonperishable food onsight in the school building, we're providing families with an opportunity to take what they need without planning an additional trip outside their daily routine. Family liaison workers are also on site to better learn about specific needs and help spread information about other nearby resources.

UKRAINIAN OUTREACH

For anyone following the news this year, it's been plain to see the devastation inflicted upon Ukrainian families. As it turns out, many fleeing Ukrainians have landed in the Twin Cities Metro area as they seek to rebuild their lives.

Some of the major obstacles in servicing these families are awareness and language barriers. Not only do many of these individuals not speak English, but they also are unaware of the various resources in their area.

To help mitigate this issue, ICA is partnering with the Ukrainian American Community Center, which is based in Minneapolis. Hundreds of refugee families from all over the metro, including our main service area, are flocking to this central location to seek assistance in their native language.

In an effort to spread awareness about our services, we're distributing informational flyers translated into Ukrainian at this location and in online social media groups. With in-person and over the phone translation services available at ICA, our goal is to streamline the process for refugee families that come to us for assistance with food, rent, employment, or anything else.
